



Sue is recently married and lives in Covington, Louisiana, with her husband, Christopher.














FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY




UNO Petroleum Engineering Program Sponsored by SPE and AADE



Starting in the Spring Semester of 2011, the boards of SPE/AADE have voted to sponsor the following courses to encourage more awareness about the oil industry and its many potentially local and diverse job opportunities. Over 200 students have enrolled since 2011. As a result of these courses, a number of past students are now working in industry related fields. Despite the downturn in the industry, interest and enrollment remains steady.

These are offered within the Department of Mechanical Engineering Department as Electives.



• ENME 4765: Introduction to Petroleum Engineering

Offered in the Fall Semester

An introductory course on the oil and gas industry, with focus on the upstream sector. Topics include petroleum geology, exploration, drilling, completions, production, subsurface management, risk and cash flow analysis and the importance of the Environment, Health and Safety.

• ENME 4096: Well Drilling and Basic Completion Design

Offered in the Spring Semester

Covers the tasks performed by a Drilling Engineer in the drilling and completion of an oil or gas well. Topics include the basic components and processes of a drilling rig, the requirements for designing a well drilling and completion program, cementing, well control, including the various calculations required in the operation.

In conjunction with AADE we are investigating the possibility of introducing an additional class during the Summer Semester to introduce additional topics to the curriculum.

and FIRST LEGO 2016



The 14th annual Louisiana FIRST LEGO League (FLL) middle-school robotics program is in high gear. On Saturday, December 10th, the LA State Championship will be held at Holy Cross High School in New Orleans and is open to 60 teams who have advanced from a sanctioned LA FLL Qualifying Tournament.

Each year FIRST LEGO League releases a Challenge, which is based on a real-world scientific topic. The Challenge has three parts: the Robot Game, the Project, and the Core Values. Teams of up to ten children, with at least one adult coach, participate in the Challenge by

programming an autonomous robot to score points on a themed playing field (Robot Game), developing a solution to a problem they have identified (Project), all guided by the FIRST LEGO League Core Values. This year's challenge is ANIMAL ALLIES.

During the ANIMAL ALLIES season, students ages 9 to 14 will participate on teams to choose and solve a real-world problem in the Project.





They will also build, test, and program an autonomous robot using LEGO MINDSTORMS® technology to solve a set of missions in the Robot Game.

SPE-Delta helps sponsor this competition which promotes STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics). Please plan to attend and support these teams as they operate under the FIRSTLEGO League signature set of Core Values, celebrating discovery, teamwork, and Gracious Professionalism. Better yet, plan to Volunteer! Volunteers are also needed as Judges, Judge Assistants, Scorekeepers, Crown control, Timekeepers, Referees, Pit Managers, Greeters, Floaters.....and many other positions.
